### **Hospitality Committee Report**

8<sup>th</sup> of First Month 2017

Providing a warm and welcoming atmosphere that promotes fellowship at the Meetinghouse continues to be the purpose of the Hospitality Committee. The committee works to accomplish this with each member of the committee efficiently fulfilling specific responsibilities to the betterment of the Meeting. On a rotating schedule, members set up refreshments and clean up every First Day following Meeting for Worship. We each take one First Day a month, taking turns in the months with five First Days, so help from others is always greatly appreciated. We especially welcome extra help when members are ill or out of town. This committee has decided that it will be on duty all twelve months in 2017, even July.

The committee sets up potluck dinners that precede Meeting for Business. This small committee is very appreciative of the extra help supplied by other members of the Meeting to clean up after the pot luck so that all members can attend Meeting for Business.

It is responsible for locking the Meetinghouse.

Hospitality also coordinates set-ups and/or clean-ups for other Meeting events that are scheduled at the Meetinghouse. In the past year, this included the dessert portion of the annual Progressive Dinner to welcome new Guilford College students, set-up and beverages for a pot luck dinner to welcome our Syrian refugee family, refreshments for the memorial services for Pat Loring and Harry Nagel, and the annual Christmas party. We also set-up and provided beverages for a transgender potluck

and forum. When other special occasions arise requiring refreshments, this committee is available to provide them.

A large group of Guilford College students attended our portion of the Progressive Dinner. After being greeted in the meeting room, the students enjoyed the bountiful supply of desserts provided by our Meeting members. Many lingered to talk to Friendship members and to sing to some member-played music.

Claire Koster continues to purchase supplies for weekly refreshments.

We express gratitude to Judy Harvey for arranging greeters for each First Day. The greeters welcome all who enter the Meetinghouse, the first step of hospitality

The swiftness of House and Grounds in addressing concerns we contact them about is greatly appreciated.

The committee monitors the use of our building by outside groups. Guidelines for the use of the kitchen are posted over the kitchen sink.

#### **Treasurer's Report: First Month 2017**

Income in December 2016 totaled \$16,329.90 with \$7,919.00 to the General Fund and \$8,410.90 to the New Building Fund.

Expenses in December 2016 totaled \$1,395.16. The operating expenses totaled \$318.55 including \$112.17 for Communications plus other expenses. No supporting contributions were paid. Meeting House expenses totaled \$256.61 primarily for utilities. Contingency Fund expenses were \$200.00; and Emergency Assistance Fund expenses were \$620.00.

The Meeting's response to Query 1 is taken from query session on Second Month:

Query 1: *Do we faithfully uphold our testimony for worship which is based on silent waiting, and for a free and unprogrammed ministry that may be shared by all? Is there a living silence in which we feel drawn together by the Light of Christ, the power of God in our*

*midst; and is this inspiration carried over into our daily lives? Do we come to meeting with hearts and minds open and ready to worship in silence or in vocal ministry or prayer as the Holy Spirit leads us? Does our Meeting encourage those who may have a gift in the spoken ministry?*

Friendship Meeting is faithful in its practice of waiting worship, seeking to feel for and be directed by the perceptible presence of the Spirit of God in our midst. Vocal ministry is widely shared by those present, and we understand that it is open to anyone who is so led by the Holy Spirit.

Our meetings for worship are frequently blessed with a sense of the presence and power of God in our midst, in which our experience of being a single community is strengthened and made more precious. The daily lives of those in our community bear witness to the ways in which this living presence stays with us.

The quality of our meetings for worship indicates that most arrive with hearts and minds open and prepared. There is little indication that any come with a set intention to speak or to be silent.

We are actively seeking a fuller understanding of what it means to have a spiritual gift, particularly a gift in vocal ministry, and what would be appropriate encouragement from the meeting as a body to those who give evidence of having such a gift.

**Role of the Clerk**

From the Clerk of the Meeting

Prepare the agenda with input from committee chairs.

Receive committee reports.

Find out whether I will be asking the meeting to receive, accept, or decide a matter.

The Spirit favors the well prepared.

Begin with a period of worship.

Create a safe environment:

\*insist that people be recognized before speaking.

\*interrupt if two or more people get into a dialogue with just themselves.

\*ask the meeting to “settle” inviting time for reflection.

\*be willing to interrupt people who burden the meeting by repeating what has already been said or by speaking at too great a length.

\*slow things down by being slow to recognize the next speaker.

Help people stay focused on the matter at hand by identifying a matter that belongs elsewhere on the agenda or at a different meeting.

**Role of those present**

\*Give thought to the meeting ahead of time.

If supporting materials are available in advance, give attention to them.

\*Come prepared mentally and spiritually to do the business of the community in a spirit of worship.

\*Wait to be recognized. Speak to the clerk, not to a Friend nearby.

\*Speak your truth, but then release it to the meeting and to the Spirit guiding the meeting.

\*Listen empathetically to others and hold in the Light those people and ideas with whom you seem be in disagreement.

Consider an attitude of curiosity rather than an attitude of judgment.

\*Refrain from repeating what has already been said.

\*Challenge yourself to trust the Light that is given to others, being open to new truth, revelation, and insight.

\*Be teachable.

\*Practice the spiritual discipline of patience.

\*Hold the clerk and the recording clerk in the Light.

The role of those not present is to show up next time.
